Ninety-Nine

Discussion

- What does Al-Jalil mean?
- What sign of Allah's majesty can you find outside today?
- Why is Prophet Muhammad (pbuh) called Allah's greatest gift?

Activity

Students write or draw one giant sign of Allah's majesty (stars, oceans, mountains) and one tiny sign (a seed, a shell, an ant). Then they finish the sentence: "My favorite gift from Allah is..."

The Sweetest Smile

Discussion

- What does this teach us about comforting a sad friend?
- How can a small, playful moment be an act of mercy?

Activity

In pairs, students take turns making silly, gentle faces to make each other laugh — just like the Prophet (pbuh) did for Hasan. No words needed, just kindness and a smile.

Anti-Boredom Corner

Discussion

- Why did the Prophet (pbuh) want us to be gentle with animals?
- What is one animal you could help today?
- How does caring for a small creature bring a big reward?

Activity

Students pick one animal-kindness mission: sketching a tiny water bowl for backyard birds or designing a kindness-patrol badge. Then they share their mission with the class.



The Cookie Nobody Saw

Pre-Reading

- Have you ever wanted something that wasn't yours?
- Why is it hard to be honest when nobody is watching?

Discussion

- Why did Adam almost keep the cookie?
- What did Adam's mom teach him about honesty?
- Why did Adam feel proud even though nobody saw him do it?

Activity

Students divide a piece of paper into three columns and create one drawing in each: a time when being honest was difficult, what "nobody is watching" means to them, and one way they can practise honesty this week. Then discuss as a class why doing the right thing feels good even when no one sees it.

Foods from the Prophet's Table

Discussion

- What can we learn from the Prophet's (pbuh) eating habits?

Activity

Have a Sunnah food picnic.

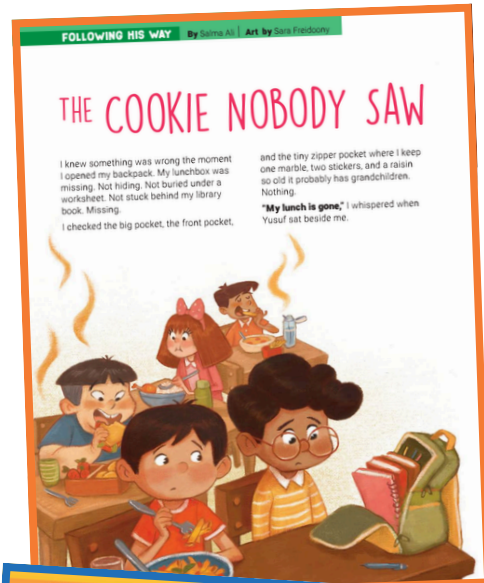
CompeTest

Discussion

- Which "would you rather" was the hardest to choose?
- Why can even a small choice be a big deed?

Activity

Students play Would You Rather: Good Deed Edition, then invent one new good-deed pair of their own.



Sami Unfiltered

Pre-Reading

- What is Mawlid an-Nabi, and why do we celebrate it?
- What is one Sunnah of the Prophet (pbuh) you already know?

Discussion

- Why did Sami's family play a Prophet's-characteristics pantomime game?
- Which Mawlid fact from Sami's post surprised you the most?
- How can a family game help everyone remember the Prophet's example?

Activity

In class, students play Sami's family game: one student pantomimes a characteristic of the Prophet (pbuh)—mercy, patience, honesty, gentleness—while classmates guess which one it is.

Sunnah in Action

Discussion

- Why did the Prophet (pbuh) begin his day by thanking Allah, and what can we learn from this?
- What small chore did the Prophet (pbuh) do himself that we could also do at home?
- Why is it important to spend quiet moments remembering and speaking to Allah?

Activity

Sunnah Stations:

Set up five spots around the room:

- Morning Gratitude
- Helping at Home
- Kindness in the Street
- Time for People
- Quiet Moments with Allah

Groups rotate and act out one gesture at each stop.



Zoom: A Day in the Life of the Prophet

Pre-Reading

- Show images or mime: waking, eating, helping, praying. Which part of the day is this?
- What do you already picture about the Prophet's (pbuh) daily life?

Discussion

- How did the Prophet (pbuh) begin and end each day?
- Why did he do small chores himself?
- Why did prayer give light to his whole day, not just a corner of it?

The Sandal by the Door

Discussion

- Why was Harith surprised to see the Prophet (pbuh) mending his own sandal?
- How did one small action change the way Harith saw everyday work?

Activity

Each student traces a hand and draws one helpful task inside it.

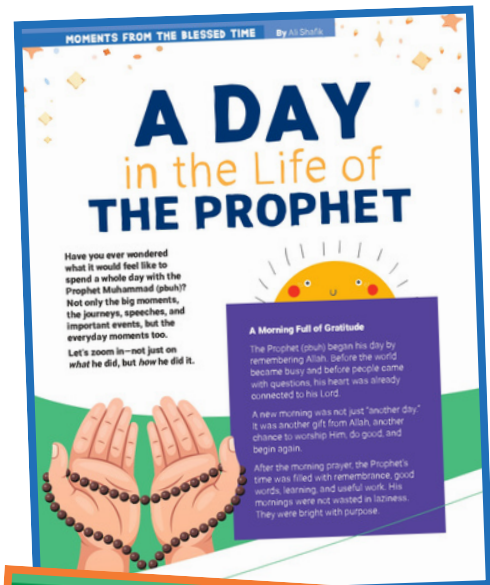
The Brave Firsts

Discussion

- Why was Abu Bakr (ra) called "the Truthful One," and what does this tell us about his character?
- Why did Abu Bakr (ra) remain by the Prophet's side, even during difficult and dangerous times?
- What words and actions show that someone is a loyal and trustworthy friend?

Activity

Students complete the sentence: "A loyal friend is someone who ____." Then, they write one specific action they can take this week to show loyalty to a friend.



Tech High5

Discussion

- Which Seerah technology surprised you the most?
- How do digital maps help us picture the Prophet's (pbuh) journeys?
- Why is it important to protect old manuscripts and recordings?

Activity

Students match the issue's five Seerah tools—maps, models, manuscripts, audio, timelines—to what each helps us do. In pairs, they pick a favorite and explain why.

Surah Spotlight

Discussion

- What was the first word Allah revealed to the Prophet (pbuh), and why was it so important?
- Why does Islam teach us that knowledge and the ability to learn are gifts from Allah?
- How can staying humble help us listen, ask questions, and continue learning?

Activity

Students draw a small treasure chest and fill it with three things they want to learn this year.

Underneath, they write: "Iqra!"

Discussion

- What made Medina welcome the Prophet (pbuh) with open arms?
- Why is Al-Masjid an-Nabawi so special to Muslims today?

Activity

"Students design a postcard: maybe a drawing of the Green Dome on the front, a landmark, food, and a welcome message in Arabic (salaam) to a friend.
